

TAG IS MAKING A DIFFERENCE

Growth in TAG usage after several years of decline. In recent years, the award went up while the appropriation remained steady, because of fewer completed applications.

Thanks to the General Assembly who supported the change of the deadline to help capture 'late deciders' and to allow the creation of an online app.

Innovations have worked!

The number of TAG recipients has rebounded to 22K.

We are getting dollars into the hands of Virginia students, supporting enrollment and retention, making college accessible and affordable.

Additional appropriations are needed to maintain current award amount and increase it.

CONTINUE INVESTMENT IN VIRGINIA'S STUDENTS

For quick math, every additional \$50 in award amount costs approximately \$1M

Status Quo (\$5,250) Total appropriation New money Total appropriation Year I (FY27) \$7.7M \$120M Year 2 (FY28) \$9.6M \$122M

Increase award to \$5,500 in Yr 1:

New money (Status quo + \$250) Total Appropriation

Year I (FY27) (\$7.7M + \$4.9M) \$125M

Increase award to \$6,000 in Yr 2:

New money (Status quo + \$500)

Year 2 (FY28) (\$9.6M + \$14.5M) \$136M

LICENSE TAG PARITY

Private colleges seek to partner with DMV, like public institutions, allowing our schools access to the contact info of those purchasing school branded, vanity tags. (Senator Bagby)

Internship Coordinator -- DHRM

The state is among the largest employers in the state, and it has an aging workforce. Support creation of a single coordinating position at DHRM to help link agencies with students seeking internships. (Delegate Sullivan).

VIVA (The Virtual Library of Virginia)

One of Virginia's enduring and most successful public/private partnerships, VIVA enables academic libraries around the state to pool purchasing power when subscribing to academic publications. The presence of the private institutions in the pool helps to moderate costs for the public institutions and make more journals available to students/scholars without regard to institutional affiliation.
